In this first issue of *Mount Angel Letter* for 2025, I am pleased to share that you will read many stories of hope in connection with the central theme of the current Jubilee Year, "Pilgrims of hope." In *Spes non confundit*, Pope Francis's Bull of Indiction which opened the Jubilee Year, he writes that, "In the heart of each person, hope dwells as the desire and expectation of good things to come, despite not knowing what the future may be." We can have a firm "expectation of good things to come" because Christ has conquered sin and death through his Paschal Mystery and will come again in glory. It is this hope that we celebrate and ponder throughout the Lenten and Easter seasons.

At the very beginning of 2025, some of our monks and seminarians traveled to Salt Lake City to participate in SEEK25, a conference organized by the Fellowship of Catholic University Students (FOCUS) with thousands of participants. I asked Dr. Keough to travel to this congress because I knew Mount Angel had an important contribution to make on an international level. I already see a renewed enthusiasm and confidence among our Seminary faculty and students in the theological contributions they are making in service to the greater Church.

I pray that these stories and the others you will read in this issue inspire hope in you. As you read, I encourage you to reflect on how the Holy Spirit is working in your own life. Here I take St. Paul's words as my own to bless and encourage you: "May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that by the power of the Holy Spirit you may abound in hope" (Romans 15:13).

Striving in Hope YEARS OF MONASTIC PROFESSION

"For 50 years now, we have been saying with [Saint] Paul: 'I have been crucified with Christ, and it is no longer I who live, but Christ who lives in me," said Abbot Jeremy during his homily on his Golden Jubilee of Monastic Profession with Br. Claude Lane and †Fr. Nathan Zodrow. On December 15, 2024, Gaudete Sunday, these three monks, who have shaped so much of Mount Angel's recent history and legacy, renewed their monastic vows of stability, obedience, and fidelity to the monastic way of life. They first made these vows into the hands of Prior Anselm Galvin on September 8, 1974.

At a private gathering with family and friends after the liturgy, Abbot Jeremy, Br. Claude, and Fr. Nathan watched a surprise video put together by members of the monastic community which contained photos of them along with their stories of how they came to Mount Angel Abbey. Below are some excerpts from those stories, showing how God called these men to follow him as monks of Mount Angel:

ABBOT JEREMY: "I was so impressed by the life of the monks. I found that the more I learned, the more I felt drawn to follow in the footsteps of those monks who had dedicated their lives to prayer and work."

BR. CLAUDE: "In the summer of 1971, Gary Zodrow and I visited Mount Angel Abbey. As we drove up the hill, seeing the Stations of the Cross, we didn't need words—both of us thought: 'This is the place."

FR. NATHAN: "There was something nearly overwhelming about the drive up the hill. We stayed for the vespers hour, where I was smitten by chant, the divine presence, monks in habits, and the quiet hospitality. It seemed to be the answer to our question."





SEEKING THINGS ABOVE at SEEK

"If you want to know what the pulse of the American Catholic Church is, that is SEEK," says Fr. Charles Gonzalez, OSB. He, Fr. Odo Recker, OSB, and Br. Isaiah Vargas, OSB, traveled to Salt Lake City at the beginning of 2025 to participate in SEEK25, a young adult conference organized by the Fellowship of Catholic University Students (FOCUS). Held at Salt Palace Convention Center from January 1–5, more than 17,000 people gathered to celebrate the Eucharist, pray, hear inspiring talks from dynamic Catholic speakers, and connect as fellow disciples.

The monks traveled to SEEK with two goals in mind: to connect with young men considering monastic life and to share the life of Mount Angel Abbey with old and new friends. Thanks to the Holy Spirit, both goals were accomplished far beyond the monks' expectations. "We were able to gather a hundred names and email addresses of

men who are seeking to know more about monastic life and want to include Mount Angel in their discernment," says Fr. Odo, Director of Vocations.

Mount Angel's booth at SEEK was welltrafficked and made visitors feel like they were on the Hilltop. Br. Isaiah wrote calligraphy by request, and he noticed how grateful people were that monks still practice and cultivate this art. Many visitors came back to the booth multiple times, and "people became good friends of us right there and then," says Br. Isaiah.

Because of the scale of the conference, the monks reconnected with many Mount Angel Seminary alumni and other friends of the Hilltop. "I was struck by the tremendous love that so many people have for Mount Angel," says Fr. Odo. "It was for me a great opportunity to see how much a Benedictine monastery is able to impact the world."


Renew Campaign Update

FORMING THE FUTURE

Pastors of the Church

The 2024-2025 academic year at Mount Angel Seminary welcomed Fr. Anh Tran, an alumnus (Class of 2018), as Coordinator of Pastoral Formation. Being asked to take on this role has been a privilege for Fr. Tran. "One of the blessings," he said, "is getting to know these guys and working with them through the difficulties they're facing in certain ministries."

As Coordinator, Fr. Tran oversees the Seminary's service at the surrounding parishes, food pantries, or nursing homes, to name a few. At the beginning of the academic year, seminarians are given one of these on-site assignments. However, their placement is not merely an "assignment"; it is, as Fr. Tran said, a seminarian's response to the loving God he has encountered: "Once we encounter God in our lives, we can't go back. We have to serve God in some way."

All aspects of the seminarians' formation culminate in this formation of shaping *pastors*. Regarding what it means to be a pastor, Fr. Tran said, "[It is] taken from the image from Scripture that Jesus is ... laying down his life for his sheep. A pastor is one who's able to set aside his own desires and wants in order to do what he's supposed to do."

While seminarians receive invaluable formation from their service, they give equally in return. They may assist catechists in parishes, accompany the sick and dying, visit the elderly, or aid pastors in the liturgy. However, Fr. Tran says one of the greatest impacts to the surrounding community is their witness: "Nowadays, there are a lot of questions that people ask, like, 'Where is God? I don't see him.' It will be the presence of these seminarians that speaks: 'God is present.'"

Fr. Tran trusts that God will give him the graces necessary to continue to aid in the formation of the future pastors of the Church. "[Trust], I think, is key in all ministries ... In the end, God is looking out for us."

Mount Angel and the Future of Theology



"I think we're really at the forefront of theological work in the Catholic global situation here at Mount Angel Seminary," says Shawn Keough, PhD, academic dean.

At the request of Abbot Jeremy, Dr. Keough traveled to Rome in December 2024 to participate in an international congress on the "Future of Theology" with around 600 participants from six continents. Organized by the Dicastery for Culture and Education, the congress was held at the Pontifical Lateran University.

After hearing Abbot Jeremy speak about Mount Angel Seminary's curriculum at the February 2024 plenary assembly of the Dicastery for Divine Worship, Cardinal José Tolentino de Mendoça, prefect of the Dicastery for Culture and Education, decided that he wanted the first talk of the Future of Theology congress to be about the liturgy as the fountain of theology. Though unable to attend to give the talk, Abbot Jeremy asked Dr. Keough to go because he wanted Mount Angel to be represented. "This is a talk about the future of theology, and I knew that Mount Angel had a contribution to make at that level," says Abbot Jeremy.


A unique element of the congress was the inclusion of speakers from non-theological disciplines. A celebrated Franco-Belgian novelist, Éric Emmanuel Schmitt, gave a talk on the relationship between literature and the transcendent, which reminded Dr. Keough of Mount Angel Seminary's focus on Christian humanism. "If it's relevant to being human, it's relevant to priestly formation; it's relevant to the work we do here at Mount Angel Seminary," says Dr. Keough.

At the Seminary, the fruits from the congress are continuing to unfold. In March, the Seminary's annual Theological Symposium focused on the history of Communion Ecclesiology at the Seminary for nearly 30 years and its continued relevance for the work of theology into the future. "I [see], in a new way, the importance of what we're doing here and the importance of it for the whole world," says Dr. Keough.

Over 17,000 Catholic young adults

gathered in Salt Lake City for the Catholic young adult conference, SEEK25, organized by the Fellowship of Catholic University Students (FOCUS) from January 1st to January 5th.

Father Michael Niemczak, Coordinator of the Propaedeutic Stage, and 15 propaedeutic seminarians from Mount Angel Seminary joined the broader Church for this event. "It was overwhelming in a great way," seminarian Joe Nguyen of the Diocese of Orange said as he recounted his arrival, "because they were all seeking after the Lord. It was overwhelming with joy and excitement."

What drew Fr. Niemczak to bring these young men to SEEK was "the contact with the broader Church ... and being inspired by their faith." *God's presence at SEEK in the lives of so many young Catholics gave the seminarians hope for the future of the Church.* His hope was that the men would take their experience there and return to work with "great joy and zeal in [their] corner of the vineyard."

A profound moment of introspection for the seminarians was the Eucharistic Adoration and Confession night. Fr. Niemczak recounted it beautifully: "There are hundreds of priests and thousands of penitents in this endless stream of mercy." For seminarian Vince Vanzuylen of the Archdiocese of Portland in Oregon, it was a moment to see how Christ could use his wounds as "a means to love all people" in

imitation of Christ's Sacred Heart. According to

Fr. Niemczak, that night helped the seminarians realize "that the Lord is not done with them in their own personal conversion; it keeps getting deeper and deeper."

Fr. Niemczak is hopeful that the propaedeutic seminarians will use their experiences at SEEK to go even deeper with Christ to become the saints that God has created them to be.

Finding a spiritual home

OBLATES OF MOUNT ANGEL

"People are looking for a way to God," says Fr. John Paul Le, OSB, Director of Oblates. Oblates of Mount Angel Abbey, who number over 660, find meaningful ways to grow in Christian discipleship through following the Rule of St. Benedict in the world. "Having a rule to guide them can lead to greater sanctity and also greater happiness," he says.

Fr. John Paul and Br. Ignatius Olivarez, OSB, the Spanish Program Director, have both noticed a growing interest among the local community in becoming an oblate. Local oblates have the added benefit of participating more regularly in Mass and the Divine Office in the Abbey church as well as oblate formation days, retreats, and socials hosted at Mount Angel. Whether oblates are local or live far away, Br. Ignatius tries "to encourage as much as possible that to become an oblate, they need to love the place, because as monks, we are vowed to a place."

The oblates receive much support in living their Christian discipleship through their spiritual association with Mount Angel, but the monks' work with the oblates also strengthens their own monastic vocations. As one who teaches oblate novice classes, Fr. John Paul is constantly reading and growing in his intellectual formation to better serve the oblate novices. For Br. Ignatius, the many prayer requests that come from oblates remind him that "you're not just praying for yourself and your family and the monastic community, but there are people in need."

From June 19–30, the monks will lead a large group of oblates on pilgrimage to Switzerland and Italy to visit important Benedictine pilgrimage sites, including Nursia, Montecassino, Subiaco, and Mount Angel's motherhouse, Engelberg Abbey.




